



He attempts to recover his life in a small town populated with an assortment of unusual characters. Yamashita only desires the quiet life with his pet eel. However a caring young woman, her jealous loanshark boyfriend and his maniacal ex-cellmate threaten to draw him back to violence. Filmed with Imamura's droll sense of humour and compassionate love for off-kilter characters.

This is the story of one boy's search for his father and one woman's search for a heart. Dora, a dour former school teacher, makes a living by writing letters for illiterate people passing through Rio de Janeiro's main train station, Central do Brasil. Workers from the impoverished suburbs commute to the city through the station and flock to Dora to contact lost family members, send love letters or simply relate details of their lives. Among her clients are Ana and her nine-year-old son Josué, who desperately wants to meet the father he has never seen.

The story of James Whale, the director of Frankenstein and The Bride of Frankenstein, in the time period following the Korean War. Whale has long since retired from the glamour of Hollywood. A lonely man he recounts many of his experiences to Clay Boone, his muscle bound gardener, and indulges in fantasies by coaxing Boone to model for him while his stern housekeeper, Hannah, looks on disapprovingly.
